## **2. Focus points**

### **2.1 – Communication**

One of the core values of the associations under StOP, and therefore crucial that this is highly valued within StOP. Good communication is the foundation of a smoothly running organization. It contributes to fast and effective action, making goal-oriented work possible. The 14th 25th board will achieve this by proactively engaging in the various meetings they have with different institutions. Examples include the University, University of Applied Sciences, the municipality, PKvV, and LAssO. In addition, there are short lines of communication with the study associations, so they can also be informed quickly. The board is always open to feedback from its members, and they are eager to hear which form of communication works best for them as well.

### **2.2 – Sharing of knowledge**

Through GroVer and KleVer, the 14th 25th board will strive to promote knowledge sharing between the study associations. Problems and obstacles rarely occur in just one association. Having conversations with fellow board members can therefore help in finding solutions to these issues. The usual trainings – such as those on acquisition, promotion, VCP, and emergency response (BHV) – will also be organized. Furthermore, maintaining good relations with the educational institutions plays an important role here, with StOP aiming to act as an easy channel of communication between them and the study associations.

### **2.3 – Connection**

In addition to knowledge sharing, social connection and building informal bonds between the study associations are also crucial for a successful year for the board members. The 14th 25th board wants to facilitate this and therefore intends to attend as many constitution drinks and activities organized by its members as possible. This connection is also fostered through cooperation in the committees for interfaculty activities. Finally, the board activity will also contribute to strengthening informal ties between the associations.

### **2.4 – Social Reach**

The 14th 25th board wants to build on the efforts of the boards and members of previous years. The focus on ongoing initiatives of educational institutions – for example, Leiden University's well-being weeks – will therefore be continued, while also motivating the study associations to participate. Student Wellbeing is also a major portfolio, to which much attention and energy will be devoted. For example, participation in the Cokeshow, if it is organized again, and involvement in the Student Cooperation for a Safe Leiden (SSVL). For

this, it is essential that the board itself takes a proactive stance in order to guarantee involvement.

### **3. General Policy**

#### **3.1 – General Assemblies**

The convocation for the General Assembly (GA) is sent by the secretary to the member associations at least five working days prior to the GA. In light of the internationalization of many study associations, the GAs will be conducted in English. However, if only Dutch-speaking members are present, the GA will be held in Dutch. The policy documents will be made available in both English and Dutch. If the GA is held in Dutch, an English summary will be provided. To increase attendance and participation at GAs, points for the StOP Cup will be awarded to the attending member associations, as in previous years. With sustainability in mind, the policy documents will only be distributed digitally.

#### **3.2 – Audit Committee**

StOP has an Audit Committee consisting of representatives from its member associations. The members of the Audit Committee are rotated and elected during the Transfer GA. This is done to ensure the financial transparency of StOP. The Audit Committee will review the treasurer of StOP twice a year. During this review, the budget, balance sheet, and all reimbursements of StOP board members will be checked.

#### **3.3 – Advisory Council**

The Advisory Council (RvA) consists of former board members of StOP from different years. Together, they form the institutional memory of StOP and support the current board with solicited and unsolicited advice. The RvA can provide input on new proposals and give advice based on their expertise and past experience. The RvA has no voting rights at the GA and no formal supervisory role, but serves as an easily accessible source of information for the board. The board hopes to maintain a good relationship with the RvA and keeps them informed of relevant developments.

#### **3.4 – Association Consultations and Assessors**

The Association Consultations (VerOs) are an important tool for communication between the University/University of Applied Sciences, the study associations, and StOP. The board aims to attend all VerOs of the different faculties. By attending these meetings, StOP can provide information about developments within the University and University of Applied Sciences, stay informed about issues within the study associations, and gather opinions on certain

matters. In addition, StOP topics can be raised, and activities can be promoted. The faculty-responsible board member maintains contact with the relevant assessor and discusses the interests of the study associations within that faculty. The 14th 25th board is also working on building connections with the Leiden Assessors Consultation (LAssO), and regular meetings will be held between the chairs. The portfolio distributions of both bodies have been exchanged, making it easier for assessors to approach the responsible StOP board members, and vice versa.

### **3.5 – Contact with Leiden University and University of Applied Sciences Leiden**

To maintain strong ties with Leiden University and the University of Applied Sciences Leiden, the board will be in contact with them throughout the coming year. This contact is meant both to represent the member associations and to advocate for their interests, as well as to pass on matters from the two educational institutions to the associations. The board will therefore hold discussions with relevant staff members of the University and University of Applied Sciences at various times.

### **3.6 – Interfaculty Activities**

In collaboration with various study associations, StOP will organize five interfaculty activities this year: the Interfaculty Party, the Interfaculty Gala, the sports tournament, the Leiden Debate, and an event focused on internationalization. The specific form of the internationalization activity will be determined later in cooperation with the committee. The Interfaculty Congress has not been organized in recent years, and will not take place this year either.

It has been decided to organize only one edition of the Leiden Debate this year, despite both national and municipal elections taking place. This is because the national elections are approaching very quickly, in October. As a result, the committee would have little time to contribute substantively to the organization of the event, which would place too much pressure on the responsible board members in too short a timeframe.

All interfaculty activities initiated by StOP are listed in the annual plan and in the policy documents. Specific information about these activities can be found under the portfolio sections.

### **3.7 – StOP Cup**

This year, the board will once again award the StOP Cup. This healthy competition between boards fosters greater connection and engagement, which is exactly what StOP strives for.

## Policyplan 2025-2026 - Study Association Deliberation Platform

The winner of the StOP Cup will ultimately be determined by the points the boards collect throughout the year, and it will be awarded at the Transfer GA. It is the responsibility of the associations themselves to keep track of the activities for which they earn points. This (Excel) overview must be submitted to the StOP board at the end of the academic year.

### 4. Portfolio's

Within this chapter, an overview will be presented of the distribution of the portfolios and their policies for 2025–2026. The structure of the list follows the board positions. The portfolios are listed in the order of their Dutch titles.

## **5. President**

### **5.1 – Acquisition**

A major source of income for many associations is acquisition. It is therefore crucial that the board members responsible for this can act with confidence. To support this, StOP is happy to assist its boards by providing a training. The aim of this training is to teach board members new techniques and to allow them to exchange ideas with one another. This training has proven useful in recent years, and the goal is therefore to organize it again at the beginning of the academic year.

### **5.2 – GroVer**

This year, the Groot Verenigen Overleg (GroVer) will again be continued. This consultation is intended for large associations with around one thousand or more members. In past years, it has proven to be extremely valuable for the associations, making its continuation self-evident. The current members of the GroVer are: L.P.S.V. Aescalapius, BASIS, B.I.L., CDL, CoDe, De Leidsche Flesch, Emile, J.F.V. Grotius, HSVL, Labyrint, LBC, LIFE, MFLS, and SPIL. The aim is to organize six GroVer meetings per year, as agreed upon with the chairs during the GroVerdracht. The topics will be kept up to date with the experiences of the associations throughout the year. Associations may themselves decide which points will be discussed. In addition, current affairs from StOP will also be addressed.

The GroVer is also open to other StOP members who, due to a smaller membership size, are not normally considered for the GroVer, but who do have an affinity with the topics discussed. For admission, they can contact the board.

### **5.3 – KleVer**

The Klein Verenigen Overleg (KleVer) is aimed at study associations with fewer than a thousand members. As in previous years, KleVer has proven to be valuable and will continue in the same form this year. Just like GroVer, the main focus is on the obstacles experienced by the associations, so that the boards can support each other by sharing their own experiences. Associations may decide which points to discuss themselves. In addition, current affairs from StOP will also be addressed here. The goal this year is to organize six KleVer meetings. This number was decided on at the first KleVer.

### **5.4 – Leiden Debate**

The Leiden Debate is organized every year, where multiple speakers come together to discuss social themes, often linked to elections. This year, two elections will take place: the

national elections in October and the municipal elections in March. It has been consciously decided not to organize the Leiden Debate for the national elections, despite their larger scale. This is because the elections would take place shortly after the start of the academic year, leaving the committee without sufficient time to actively participate in the preparations. Therefore, the focus this year will be on the municipal elections. The chair is enthusiastic about working with the committee to deliver an excellent debate for Leiden students.

## **5.5 – National Platform**

This year too, StOP will commit itself to the national consultation platform, LPSV Exedra. One of the main goals remains the transfer of knowledge between associations at a national level. A second goal is the advocacy of study associations at the national level, including in politics. StOP's aim is to actively contribute in order to put LPSV Exedra firmly on the map and help its authority grow.

## **5.6 – Student Wellbeing**

As in previous years, Student Wellbeing will play an important and prominent role in StOP's activities. The 14th 25th board will therefore take a proactive stance when it comes to the various meetings related to this theme. For example, StOP is involved in the Student Wellbeing Declaration, where many different stakeholders of Leiden student life come together. StOP will also act as a supporting partner in the trainings on this theme organized by the University. In addition, StOP will be involved in the SOG core group, the Student Impact Hub, and the Time Out Hub (the Coke Show, if it is organized again). Finally, StOP wants to take an active role in the SSVL (Studenten Samenwerking Veilig Leiden), a valuable initiative of its members.

# **6. Secretary**

## **6.1 Alumni**

The secretary will focus on establishing, facilitating, and maintaining contact between alumni and associations. Additionally, the focus will be on promoting knowledge-sharing between the different associations. If associations have questions about their alumni policy, the secretary can either provide advice directly or forward the question to, for example, a GroVer or KleVer.

## **6.2 Board Activity**

The Board Activity will be an informal event aimed at connecting the boards of different associations. By bringing these boards together in a low-threshold and informal setting, StOP hopes to foster collaboration and knowledge exchange between associations. Efforts will be made to organize an activity that is accessible to everyone.

### **6.3 Diversity & Inclusion**

In recent years, diversity and inclusion have been key priorities for both Leiden University and Leiden University of Applied Sciences. This portfolio focuses on creating a welcoming environment for underrepresented groups and promoting additional support and initiatives. Study associations play an indispensable role in this, as they are directly connected to students. If a study association wishes to organize an event on diversity and inclusion, or seeks contact with the university on this matter, the secretary is always open to supporting the association. The secretary will also reach out to the university and university of applied sciences to learn how they currently approach this portfolio.

### **6.4 Plexus**

This year, the secretary will maintain contact with the contact person at Plexus. The secretary will also manage the StOP mailbox located at Plexus.

### **6.5 Study Association Guide**

The Study Association Guide contains information about all associations that are members of StOP. Its aim is to improve relations between the boards and encourage cooperation. The guide can be seen as a kind of friendship book. After gathering the information from the member associations, the guide will be distributed during the first semester of the academic year. The secretary also aims to carry out more preparatory work for the Study Association Guide for the following academic year, so that the guide can be published earlier next year.

### **6.6 VCP**

The StOP board has decided to continue building on the portfolio of the *Confidential Contact Person*. In recent years this has gone well, and associations have had ample opportunity to appoint a confidential contact person. StOP also intends to organize training sessions for confidential contact persons in the first semester. In addition, StOP wants to explore the possibility of collaborating more closely with the PKvV in this area, to give even more associations the opportunity to participate in training. Naturally, StOP member associations will be given priority for our own training sessions.

## **7. Treasurer**

### **7.1 – Board Grants (RFOS)**

The topic of board grants plays an important role within the boards of many study associations. This scheme offers students the opportunity to combine their commitment to their association with financial support from Leiden University. Throughout the year, the StOP will play a role in informing study associations about the application procedure, eligibility requirements, and deadlines related to the board grants. Associations are therefore encouraged to contact the StOP board with any questions regarding the allocation or application of these grants. The Treasurer of the StOP will be responsible for collecting up-to-date information and staying informed about any changes concerning the board grants, serving as the board's main point of contact in this area. In addition, opportunities will be explored to support study associations at the University of Applied Sciences Leiden in the application process, eligibility criteria, and deadlines concerning their respective board grant system.

### **7.2 – BHV**

At the end of the academic year, a first aid and emergency response (BHV) course will once again be organized for study associations affiliated with Leiden University. As in previous years, the StOP will play a facilitating role by communicating available dates to the associations and compiling a list of participants, which will be shared with the University's contact person. This process is based on a fixed list of associations that have participated in the BHV course in previous years. Associations not included in this standard list may submit a motivated request to be considered for participation. It is important for associations to understand that the number of available spots is limited, and that not every association requires a board member trained in BHV. Therefore, the motivation must clearly demonstrate a concrete need for having a BHV-trained board member within the association. The same applies to associations that already have board members participating in the course but wish to request additional spots.

For the BHV course organized for study associations at Leiden University of Applied Sciences (Hogeschool Leiden), the StOP currently does not serve a facilitating role. However, the board will inform these associations about opportunities to follow a BHV course within the University of Applied Sciences. During their term, the 12th 25th board investigated the possibilities of organizing a first aid (EHBO) training for the associations. Their findings indicated that such an initiative is nearly unfeasible from an organizational

standpoint, due in part to the limited number of providers and the university's unwillingness to cover the associated costs. Therefore, as was the case last year, no further steps will be taken this year to establish an EHBO training.

### **7.3 – Overlap Committee**

This year, two board members of the StOP will once again participate in the Overlap Committee. This committee is composed of representatives from the Executive Board of Leiden University, the Student Advisors Consultation (STAP), the Local Chamber of Associations (PKvV), the EL CID Board / the *Vademecum* Committee, and the Leiden Assessor Consultation (LAssO), which acts as an observer. The representative(s) of the StOP are responsible for safeguarding the interests of study associations, particularly those affiliated with StOP. The committee primarily focuses on the introduction activities for first-year students, including introduction weeks and weekends. A key point of attention is the prevention of scheduling conflicts between the Free Activities Period (VAP) of A.L.S.V. Quintus and the first-year activities organized by study associations at the beginning of the academic year. The objective is to ensure that these activities no longer coincide, so that first-year students are not forced to choose between them. To achieve this, it is essential that clear agreements are made between all involved parties in a timely manner, which is typically in January or February, and that these agreements are respected. The StOP Board will ensure that the agreed arrangements are communicated to its member associations, enabling them to anticipate and prepare accordingly.

### **7.4 – Sustainability**

Sustainability remains an important and highly relevant theme within many associations. At the same time, associations often struggle with how to integrate sustainability into their activities and policies in a feasible and effective manner. For this reason, study associations are actively encouraged to contact the StOP Board when they wish to develop sustainable initiatives or organize sustainability focused events within their association. The StOP is happy to provide input and support in exploring possibilities. In addition, the Treasurer maintains contact throughout the year with the Leiden University Green Office (LUGO) in order to keep associations informed about relevant developments, partnerships, and sustainability initiatives within the university.

## **7.5 – Interfaculty Gala (InFaGa)**

The InFaGa Committee is tasked with organizing a gala for board members and the members of their respective associations. For larger associations, a gala often represents a highlight of the academic year, whereas smaller associations may lack the financial resources or membership size to organize such an event independently. The Interfaculty Gala therefore provides an alternative, offering all associations affiliated with StOP the opportunity to contribute to its organization. The specific details of the gala—such as the theme, location, and program—are determined by the committee.

## **7.6 – Introduction Weeks**

In light of recent developments within the EL CID, such as the addition of the Study Associations Block to the program, it was decided during the portfolio allocation to separate the Overlap Committee and the Introduction Weeks into two distinct portfolios.

Over the past year, the Board visited all study associations during the Study Associations Block, and the intention is to continue this practice in the coming year. In addition, the Board aims to support study associations with practical matters and the organization of this block, including by discussing it during the Vero meetings. This year, the Board will also represent the interests of study associations—together with the Overlap Committee—in relation to the weekly programs of the various introduction weeks, such as EL CID, HOP, and OWL. As part of this effort, the Board will maintain contact with the student associations involved.

## **7.7 – PLNT**

The 14th 25th Board looks forward to continuing its collaboration with PLNT Leiden. This partnership focuses, among other things, on the shared use of facilities and the organization of activities, offering associations the opportunity to benefit from PLNT's extensive network. Currently, the StOP is working with PLNT Students in relation to the Investment and Entrepreneurship Fund (I&E Fund). Through this fund, associations may be eligible for support in undertaking entrepreneurial or innovative projects. The Treasurer of the StOP will remain involved in all meetings concerning the I&E Fund, acting as a representative of the associations. In addition, the Treasurer will regularly attend the weekly PLNT community gatherings to stay informed about relevant developments and to advocate for the interests of study associations. To further support associations in identifying suitable funding opportunities, the Board will develop a funding guide this year. This guide will provide an

overview of available funds, including guidelines, eligibility criteria, and application procedures.

## **7.8 – StOP Day**

StOP Day is an event organized at the beginning of the academic year to introduce the boards of member associations to the StOP, its board, and the various committees operating within the organization. The aim is to provide a clear understanding of the role StOP plays within the associations and the support it can offer them. Throughout the day, presentations are given by the StOP Board and various other organizations. These contributions focus primarily on sharing knowledge, providing practical information, and strengthening collaboration between the associations and StOP. The day concludes with an informal social gathering, offering space for further networking and interaction between the association boards.

# **8. Commissioner of Internal Relations**

## **8.1 - Housing**

The Housing portfolio was introduced last year and it has been decided to continue it this year. Recently, more and more organisations have been contacting StOP about housing. The board member with the portfolio will be the point of contact for these questions. However, StOP does not expect to take a proactive approach to the subject of housing.

## **8.2 - Interfaculty Party**

The InFaFe committee is the StOP committee responsible for organising the annual Interfaculty Party (InFaFe). The committee consists of various member associations and its main goal is to create more visibility for study associations and the StOP. In addition, the InFaFe aims to bring the member associations of the various faculties closer together in a friendly and informal way. Last year, the following associations participated in the organisation: B.I.L., CoDe, De Leidsche Flesch, Emile, HSVL, J.F.V. Grotius, Labyrinth, L.P.S.V. „Aesculapius”, M.F.L.S. and SPIL. All member associations can register with the StOP for the committee.

### **8.3 - National Policy**

National Policy is a new portfolio this year, but does not yet cover any new topics. The aim of setting up this portfolio is to create a point of contact within StOP for policy questions. These may concern, for example, the Algemene Verordening Gegevensbescherming (AVG), but also the WBTR. Most of the articles of association of our member associations now comply with the requirements of the WBTR, and there have been fewer and fewer questions from the associations in recent years. However, StOP remains open to helping its members with this issue. The aim this year is to provide additional support for the implementation of the AVG in the member associations.

### **8.4 - Newsletter**

The Commissioner of Internal Relations sends a periodic newsletter to the member associations. The purpose of this newsletter is to keep the member associations informed of the activities of StOP and to share important information relevant to study associations. In addition, the newsletter provides member associations with an opportunity to promote open activities. Member associations can submit these activities to the Commissioner of Internal Relations.

## **9. Commissioner of External Relations and Vice-president**

### **9.1 - Internationalisation**

Since many of our member associations have internationalised in recent years, or are still in the process of doing so, a portfolio dedicated to internationalisation remains of great value. Sharing knowledge about the internationalisation process, the needs of international students, and challenges related to language use has proven to be very useful for associations.

Two years ago, the portfolio was given a new focus when StOP entered into a collaboration with the Van Bergen Fund Foundation. The foundation made resources available to support study associations in organising internationalisation activities. All study associations of Leiden University and University of Applied Sciences Leiden can still apply to the foundation for subsidies for this purpose. Applications are assessed by a specially appointed committee.

In addition, this year, under the guidance of StOP, several study associations will organise a form of an Internationalisation Cultural Festival. The Festival is intended to encourage the coming together of Dutch and international students and to celebrate different cultures.

### 9.2 - Media

The management of the website remains under the Media portfolio. This responsibility will mainly consist of maintaining and updating the website so that it reflects the most recent developments and remains a reliable source of information. In recent years, considerable progress has been made in improving the website, making it more user-friendly and accessible. Nevertheless, the board remains open to suggestions for further improvement so that the website can continue to effectively support the needs of member associations and students.

In addition to the website itself, the use of the digital calendar will also be continued, as it plays an important role in keeping both associations and individual students informed about upcoming activities and events organised by StOP. By combining the website and the digital calendar, the board aims to provide clear and accessible communication so that information reaches the widest possible audience.

StOP maintains several social media channels, namely Instagram, Facebook, LinkedIn, and WhatsApp. These are mainly used to promote its own activities, but also the activities of member associations and partners whose promotion is in the common interest of the study associations. Examples include activities aimed at a broader audience than the members of a single association, or activities by partners such as PLNT, Leiden University, or the University of Applied Sciences in Leiden.

The promotional content on Instagram and Facebook overlaps and will therefore be (almost) identical. Promotion may take the form of photos, information, or other material related to the activities being promoted, as well as announcements of other matters such as a new board or other topics the board deems appropriate. The board will ensure that the social media channels are kept as up-to-date as possible.

This year, the board wants to properly launch and actively use LinkedIn, both to increase StOP's visibility among a wider audience and due to the growing popularity of this platform.

In addition, the board will set up a WhatsApp Community instead of a single group, so that separate group chats can be created for different activities. This structure makes it easier and more accessible to share information with as many member associations as possible.

## **Policyplan 2025-2026 - Study Association Deliberation Platform**

Board members of member associations are allowed to join the Community, and all subsequent information shared there will be distributed via the board, after which the member associations may be requested to share this information further.

### **9.3 - Promotion Training**

In the coming year, the board plans to organise a promotion training session around November. This training is intended to support member associations in effectively promoting their activities and events and will provide practical tools in the areas of communication strategies, social media use, and content creation. The board will ensure that the training is accessible and relevant, and encourages active participation and the sharing of best practices among all participants.

### **9.4 - Sports Tournament**

Last year's football tournament was a great success, with high attendance and positive feedback that highlighted both the competitive and social aspects of the event. Based on this success, the board plans to organise the football tournament again this year. The goal is to encourage even more participation and once again provide an opportunity for associations and students to come together.
